

ENGAGING WITH YOUR LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

What is a school board and what is its role?

In Montana, a school board is a group of people who make important decisions for the local school district. They are like the bosses of the schools. The primary roles of a school board in Montana includes:

- **Make Rules (Policies):** School boards create rules for how the schools should run. These rules cover things like what students should learn, how they should behave, and how teachers and staff should do their jobs.
- Handle Money (Budget & Finance): School boards help decide how the district's money should be spent. They work with the school administrators to figure out how much money each school should get and what it should be used for.
- **Hiring and Evaluation:** School boards choose the Superintendent and have a say in hiring principals and teachers. They make sure the people who work in the schools are doing a good job.
- **Community Engagement:** School boards talk to parents, students, teachers, and others in the community. They want to know what people think and what they need. They take all of this information into account when making decisions.
- Plan for the Future (Educational Planning & Accountability): School boards set goals and plans for the district. They want the schools to do well, so they keep track of how students are doing and make sure everyone is accountable for how well the schools are doing.

It's important to note that the specifics of a school board's structure and responsibilities may vary slightly between districts in Montana, as each district operates autonomously under the oversight of the Montana Office of Public Instruction.
